## **Dry? Consider Early Weaning**



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Rainfall ranks as one of the most important factors that influence ranchers' management decisions, according to North Dakota State University Extension specialists.

This year is no different. Parts of the region are experiencing severe dry weather while others have adequate to plentiful moisture. This situation drives management of native pasture, crop residue and cover crop acres.

Typically, even with good moisture at this time of year, the nutritional value of native pasture is in decline. This decline is accelerated under dry conditions.

"Early weaning is one of the management decisions that can help reduce pressure on native pastures and extend forage supplies for adult beef cows," says Janna Block, Extension livestock systems specialist at NDSU's Hettinger Research Extension Center.

"Early weaning simply means weaning calves at an earlier age to reduce forage usage, while not compromising calf health and performance," she adds.

Beef calves can be early weaned successfully from 60 to 150 days of age. Most producers will notice that nursing calves also will consume forage,

whether through grazing or being fed harvested forages. Research shows that early weaned cows will consume as much as 35% to 45% less forage than normally weaned cow-calf pairs.

Early weaning typically results in improved body condition of dams due to decreased nutrient requirements. A cow weighing 1,400 lbs. would require about 16 lbs. of total digestible nutrients (TDN) and 2.5 lbs. of crude protein (CP) on a daily basis in late lactation. This same cow's requirement would decrease to 12 lbs. of TDN and 1.7 lbs. of protein after weaning. In addition, water requirement would decrease by about 55% to 65%.


Distinguishing between early weaning and creep feeding is important based on goals of each strategy. Creep feeding is providing supplemental feed to nursing calves. The primary goal of creep feeding is to increase weaning weight of calves.

While creep feeding may result in some substitution of forage for creep fed, it does not reduce nursing pressure on cows. Therefore, this practice will not provide the same forage savings and increases in cow condition that can be gained from early weaning, Block says.

Early weaning should compromise calf health, performance should be enhanced.

"The key to successful early weaning is to treat groups of calves as unique," says Gerald Stokka, NDSU Extension veterinarian and livestock stewardship specialist. "Weaning by pasture group is preferred, with no commingling of other groups after weaning for at least 45 days. Even though all calves have been born and raised on the same ranch or farm, the pasture group is the stable unit as it relates to shared organisms and social pecking order."

If weaning includes commingling all pasture groups at the same time into a common weaning pen or pasture, be prepared to begin treating calves for respiratory disease 10 to 14 days postweaning. Alternatively, make provisions to bring all cows and calves together so the social order and shared organisms of calves can be re-established prior to the stress of weaning. The more space that is provided (pasture weaning), the less the pressure on re-establishing social structure and the less transmission of organisms during this stressful time.

Other potential risk factors may influence health at this time as well.

"Lack of passive immunity, temperature fluctuations, heat stress, nutritional stress prior to weaning, dusty pens, and handling stress may negatively impact the healthy transition to weaning," Stokka says. "The lack of adequate passive

transfer of immunity from birth mother to the calf increases the risk of postweaning morbidity."

Temperature fluctuations may compromise the normal respiratory defense mechanisms, as do heat stress and dusty pen conditions. Dry conditions may result in nutritional stress prior to weaning, so make sure to provide appropriate protein, energy, an mineral supplements prior to and after weaning.

"If calves need processing, such as vaccination, deworming, etc., do so in the early morning hours or delay processing until the temperatures moderate," Stokka says. "Processing can be done at the time of weaning; however, only products that benefit the animal at weaning and do not compromise the immune response should be used. Processing done at least three weeks prior to early weaning is preferred and provides the opportunity to administer booster doses postweaning if necessary."

Facilities may need some remodeling if weaning calves are significantly smaller than normal. Calves become adept at finding ways to return to their dams or at least escaping from the weaning facility. Because smaller and younger calves may have difficulty competing for feed and water, sorting calves into several pen groups based on size and age may be a good idea.

"Early weaning is a management tool that can significantly reduce forage and water demand," Block says. "In addition, with proper preparation, calf health and performance are not compromised."

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

Boyer's steer had terrific carcass data. His steer, JASB Hank, graded Choice, was a yield grade 1, had a ribeye of 20.3 sq. in. with a dressing percent of 67.3%. The steer's hot carcass weight was 984 pounds with a .44 inch of backfat. He had the highest retail value per day on feed at \$5.392. All live cattle were sent to Tyson and the information reported is based on what they did on the rail, not just ultrasound data.

This son of FILL Elevate 260E is an example of what Limousin can do using the right genetics. Limousin cattle have come a long way to overcome the reputation of a lower quality grade with decreased marbling.

Commercial cattlemen should take note of what Limousin can do to not only increase yield but provide respectable quality grade as well. These types of numbers increase the bottom-line profit for all of our customers to consider.






Doris Marie Craft, 90, passed away June 10, 2021, at her home in Goodland, Kansas. A memorial service was held June 25, 2021

## Dr. Duane Wulf Received SDSU Distinguished Alumni Award

Pr. Duane Wulf, formerly of Morris, Minnesota, received the 2021 South Dakota State University (SDSU) Department of Animal Science Distinguished Alumni Award on April 16, 2021. The award was given at the department's annual awards program.

This Distinguished Alumni Award recognizes alumni of the department whose accomplishments have impacted the agriculture industry, communities, and individuals across the state, nation, and world. Contributions of Distinguished Alumni include outstanding professional accomplishment, sustained service to agriculture, or distinguished leadership.

Wulf graduated from SDSU with a bachelor's and master's degrees in animal science in 1989 and 1993, respectively. He was a member of the 1987 SDSU meat judging team, academic quadrathlon team, and Block and Bridle. He later received his doctorate from Colorado State University.

He worked as an assistant professor and state meat extension specialist at the Ohio State University. Three years later he transitioned back to SDSU as a professor of animal science, with



teaching and research appointment. He was a faculty member at SDSU for 10 years, receiving a multitude of awards.


In 2009 Wulf, his wife, Ann, and family moved to Mexico to pursue mission work, providing practical education, training, and career opportunities to underprivileged youth. He did this by establishing The Fatted Calf, a nonprofit organization dedicated to glorifying and obeying God by providing training and career development to the youth.


After dedicating 10 years to mission work, Wulf moved back to the U.S. and is currently serving as an associate professor at the University of Arizona.







## **Audrey Brawner Wins NALJA Carcass Contest**



## Water: A Nutrient That Deserves Respect

ater might be the Rodney Dangerfield of nutrient – it just doesn't get any respect, says Warren Rusche, South Dakota State University, in a press release. We could use the latest edition of "Nutrient Requirements of Beef Cattle" as an example. Of the six classes of nutrients discussed in that resource, water is the last topic and the shortest chapter, even though water makes up 99% of every molecule in an animal.

It is easy to fall into a trap of assuming that as long as water is present, the animal's needs are being met. However, the availability of water does not guarantee consumption. Water intake is strongly linked to feed intake, so any factors that cause cattle to drink less will lead to reduced feed intake and consequently reduced performance.

#### Water and heat stress

Water intake and water quality issues become more pronounced during the summer. Cattle need to drink more during hot weather to relieve heat stress. Some of the dams or streams that nonconfirmed cattle use in the summer may have less than optimal water quality due to sulfate or dissolved solids issues. Warm weather also leads to increased microbial and algae growth, further compromising water quality, especially if there is also fecal contamination.

#### Contamination issues

Researchers in Canada observed that yearlings that drank from clean water sources (from a well or stream directly into a trough) gained 20-23% more weight compared to yearlings that drank from a pond, either directly or if the pond water was pumped into a trough. Calves on cows showed a similar response with a 10% advantage to drinking from a clean water source.

These researchers also studied the effect of fecal contamination on water preference as well as water and feed consumption. They found that cattle tended to avoid water with as little as 50 ppm fecal contamination. Cattle ate less feed at 2500 ppm manure contamination. That represents as little as a half an ounce of fecal material in a gallon of water.

#### Effect on calf success

Monitoring waterers and water quality is critically important for starting calves. Insufficient dry matter intake during receiving can impact immune response, health outcomes, and ultimate cattle performance. Keeping waterers clean is important for any class of confined cattle, but especially true for just-weaned calves.

In some cases, the issue is less water quality but whether the calves know how to get a drink. Calves could not drink (and consequently eat very little) if they have never seen a waterer or water tank before. Letting waterers run over for a day or so will mimic the sights and sounds of natural water sources and help entice calves to drink.

#### Testing is key

Some regions are plagued with water quality issues. High sulfate levels can be particularly challenging as they are associated with reduced intake, poorer mineral metabolism, an increased risk of animal health.

Sulfates are one concern, but other substances such as Total Dissolved Solids also can affect livestock performance. Testing the water offers the surest method to determine if the water consumed by livestock could pose any issues. Water from natural sources that varies with weather conditions such as drought or precipitation runoff should be sampled more frequently compared to well water, which should be more consistent.





## **Reducing Development Costs for Replacement Heifers**

Regardless of how efficiently reproductive success is managed on the ranch, beef producers are tasked annually with incorporating new females into the herd in the form of replacement heifers. Whether purchasing females off the farm or retaining heifers from this year's cohort of marketable calves, both represent significant input costs to replace the 10–15% of cows leaving the herd annually, plus any additional heifers to expand the size of the operation in years when conditions allow. To reduce dependence on purchased or harvested feeds and susceptibility to poor weather or market conditions, there is growing interest in developing replacement heifers at a lower cost without compromising reproductive performance.

Much of the lifetime success of a beef female is determined by her performance in her first breeding season. The overall objective of any heifer development program should be for those females to conceive a pregnancy early in a defined breeding season and to calve for the first time prior to two years-of-age. Since bred heifers will still only be approximately 85% of their mature weight at calving, having a large proportion deliver early in the calving season allows these females maximal time to go through uterine involution and prepare to gestate their second calf, while affording them extra nutrients to heal and continue developing, which is why many producers begin calving heifers 21–30 days ahead of the mature cows.

#### **Historical Recommendations**

To maximize the number of heifers that have reached puberty prior to the breeding season, it has been traditionally recommended that heifers weigh 60–65% of their mature body weight. This threshold was developed at a time when cattle production systems were transitioning from calving heifers at three years-of-age to calving them as two-year-

olds. As this shift occurred, it indirectly required producers to select females that reach puberty at a lighter weight and younger age. Likewise, over the past several decades, consistent selection for increased scrotal circumference in young bulls may have indirectly decreased the age at which heifers reach puberty, as these traits are moderately correlated. Despite average mature cow sizes increasing as result of constant selection for larger yearling weights, heifers continually demonstrate the ability to reach puberty sooner and at lighter weights than have occurred historically.

#### **Opportunities For Change**

Acknowledging these changes in cattle genetics provides opportunities for producers to reduce development costs during the post-weaning period leading up to the breeding season. One caveat of dealing with such specific target percentages is the need for replacement heifers to be managed separately from the cowherd to monitor growth and development more accurately. Whether this is accomplished through allocating pastures for heifers or feeding them in a drylot, the opportunity costs associated with these options must be evaluated on an operation-to-operation basis.

Several studies in recent years have investigated whether heifers can be developed to lower bodyweight thresholds, ranging from 50–57% of their expected mature weight, without sacrificing reproductive performance. Regardless of whether heifers were developed on crop residue or dormant winter forage, collective studies from three different states all found economic benefits compared to drylot development, with savings of \$37 to \$99 per pregnant heifer.

Acceptable pregnancy rates were achieved by all groups, which is the ultimate indicator of a successful development protocol. The interesting

part of these collective datasets is that by restricting heifer intake leading up to the breeding season and then turning them out on lush pasture, these heifers experienced higher rates of average daily gain (ADG) compared with heifers developed in the drylot. Grazing habits are a learned behavior, so heifers who have been out grazing appear to perform better when turned out after breeding, and, despite entering the breeding season at a lighter weight, this compensatory gain resulted in similar weights at calving between groups.

#### **Takeaways**

Maintaining a positive plane of nutrition leading up to and immediately following breeding is crucial for the successful establishment of pregnancy, so developing heifers to a lighter bodyweight may provide advantages in adapting heifers to perform well during the breeding season in a range setting. Additionally, there is a growing body of literature suggesting economic advantages of developing heifers to lower bodyweight thresholds, without compromising conception rates. Heifers developed in low-input systems using grazed forages may gain more experience consuming forage, which aids their performance and eliminates any adaptation period when they are turned out into the environment they will be expected to perform on as mature cows. If you are breeding heifers later in the summer when forage quality is declining, consider providing additional protein to ensure adequate metabolic status. Heifers should still enter the breeding season at a body condition score of five-to-six and be in an environment that provides enough nutrients to be gaining weight. When transitioning to a low-input development system, it is recommended to retain more replacements than needed to help monitor how herd genetics respond to a nutritional challenge.

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
