## Nitrates in Forages are Risk for Pregnant Cows

rought poses many challenges to the beef cow herd. Nitrates in feed is one of those challenges that producers need to be aware of, especially in the reproductive herd.

Nitrates can be found in multiple forages and weeds, such as millet, oats, wheat, corn, sorghum, sudan, kochia, pigweed, lambsquarter, brome grass, and orchard grass, to name a few.

While all plants contain some nitrates, different management practices and unforeseen events can amplify the amount of nitrates found in forages. Conditions that can alter nitrate levels include weather (drought, freezing, hail), herbicide and fertilizer applications, and disease.

The level of nitrates in a plant is dependent on stage of maturity, soil nitrate level, amount of sunlight/ shade and the part of the plant (lowest one-third of the stem will contain the highest level of nitrate).

As a result, it is important to test your forages for nitrate levels prior to feeding.

#### **Feeding Pregnant Cows**

During this time, cows will most likely still be in the first trimester of pregnancy, depending on operationspecific breeding seasons. A majority of cattle are still out on standing forages if not being moved to subsequent standing forages.



During drought conditions, grazing standing forage crops (such as millet, sudan, etc.) is a common practice.

With the highest concentration of nitrate occurring in the lowest onethird of the plant, do not force cows to grace more than the leaves and upper stalks.

This will reduce the inflow of nitrates, because animals are allowed to be selective and will consume the higher-quality and more-palatable leaf material prior to the stalk. This is beneficial to decease toxicity.

It is also important to consider stocking density of a pasture that may be slightly higher in nitrates. Typically, cows will be selective in their grazing; however, if overstocked, this allows for less opportunity to be selective and more opportunity to overgraze or ingest weeds, thus resulting in toxicity.

Nitrate poisoning can be lethal at high enough levels. When forages high in nitrate are fed to livestock, it is converted to nitrite in the rumen. At high enough levels, nitrite, the toxic compound, is absorbed into the blood and causes decreased oxygen-carrying capacity throughout the body.

This becomes important when considering a pregnant female. If levels of nitrates become high enough, oxygen to the fetus decreases, and early abortions can occur.

If abortions are seen in the second and third trimester, when visible dispelled fetuses present themselves, look for brownish-colored blood. This would indicate the fetus lacked the oxygen it needed for survival.

Unfortunately, warning signs of high nitrates in the cow prior to abortions are unlikely.

Potential high nitrates may also be to blame for open cows.

#### **Managing Nitrates**

Testing prior to feeding forages or putting cows out on forage crops to graze is important to ensure cows do not consume toxic levels of nitrates.

If levels of nitrates are high but within a level of caution, proper management when feeding needs to be taken. Supplementing cows while they adapt to the pasture of higher nitrates



is key. This will ensure cows are full and don't overindulge, allowing them to gradually adapt to higher nitrates.

If feeding harvested feeds high in nitrates, they can be blended at different rates, depending on the level of nitrates in the forage.

Symptoms to be aware of if nitrate poisoning is occurring include

difficult and rapid breathing, mouth breathing, rapid and weak heartbeat, below-normal body temperature, muscular weakness, loss of muscle coordination, blue coloration of mucous membranes, marked dilation of pupils, collapse and death.

If any of these symptoms are noticed, pull animals from the feed source immediately and test the feed.





## Recipe of the Month

#### Mom's Sloppy Joes Hot Dish

1 lb. Hamburger, browned (you can add finely chopped onion while browning the meat)
Mix in:

1 can Chicken Gumbo soup

Then add the following ingredients:

1 cup Ketchup (more or less)

1-2 tsp. Brown sugar

1-2 cups elbow macaroni (depending on how much Sloppy Joe is leftover will determine on how much macaroni you need to cook)

Cook macaroni according to directions and drain.

Add leftover Sloppy Joe mix.
You will probably need to add more ketchup to keep it moist.
Bake in the oven for about 45-60 minutes at 350 degrees.

#### Carcass Data is Important to Raising Profitable Beef For American Consumers

As technology improves our calculations of what is needed for the American consumer food chain, it becomes almost a necessity to review carcass data or closeouts on what the beef producer is sending to the retail market. Granted, feed costs, general popularity of specific cuts of meat and natural vs steroid infused meat all play a part in producing a profitable carcass.

When producers let us know about great closeout data, we need to trumpet their success and inform commercial and seedstock producers alike as to what they can achieve by using Limousin genetics.

This week we received carcass information from Ellsworth Limousin of Elk Horn, Wisconsin. One of their purebred steers, sired by LFLC Bank Account, was harvested on September 27, 2021, weighing 1,370 pounds. Dressing out data produced a 64.3 % yield and graded Choice. His ribeye area measured 21.3 square inches. Gary was very pleased with the data and check he received.





In the last year, they reached an agreement with a butcher shop in Florida to send 20 fats per month to Florida at a market price of \$10/cwt over the local packer price paid.

Darron and Rob also purchase about 150-200 head of other feeders each year to fill out their yards. They do an excellent job of managing the cow herd and frequently wean over 98% calf crop. Overall feeding and management is excellent, the cow herd experiences high conception rates, and they are great proponents of Limousin bulls. They tell everyone they meet about the added value of using Limousin bulls.


#### Chloe Hazel Wins U-Fit-It Championship at the SD State Fair



### Wulf Cattle Celebrates 50 Years Raising Limousin

Wulf Cattle of Morris, Minnesota, reached a milestone in the Limousin cattle business. They have been in the breed for 50 years and represent a firm commitment to the value of Limousin genetics in the beef industry.

Humble beginnings is an understatement for the Wulf family. Patriarch Leonard Wulf began farming in Minnesota in 1949. He moved from Lester, Iowa, to Morris and partnered with a neighbor, Paul Fehr. Leonard and his wife, Vi, started their agricultural life together with one cow.



Vi and Leonard Wulf were inducted into the Limousin Hall of Fame in 2000.

Leonard and Paul began purchasing feeder cattle and feeding them in their feed lot in addition to farming the land. The 1950s was the age of "Baby Beef" in America. However, Leonard wanted to produce cattle that had a better yield and dressing percentage than the mainstream fat cattle. Before the age of yield grades and grids, the cattle industry sent fat cattle to market and accepted the price based on weight, however the marketing model was transitioning to prices based on carcass weight. The Wulfs were feeders before they were breeders.

Leonard wanted to increase yield and decrease wasted fat, so he began to artificial inseminate his Angus and Hereford cow herd with Charolais and other continental breed cattle in the 1960s.

In 1971, they bought Limousin bred cows from Pete Carmichael of Timber Lake, South Dakota. The calves were sired by Dandy and Diplomat. The result of the halfblood progeny impressed the Wulfs. Leonard insisted on following his production to the packer and looked at the carcasses that were hanging. The data convinced Leonard that Limousin would produce what he desired to raise.

Joining the North American Limousin Foudation in 1972, with membership number 545, Leonard built his business with the help of his children. and in addition to his cattle feeding operation, started his registered Limousin herd. The Wulf Limousin operation became iconic in the Limousin breed. Leonard believed in improving the breed. He served five terms on the North American Limousin Foundation (NALF) Board of Directors. His loyalty to the breed has been exceptional. In 2000, Leonard and Vi were inducted into the North American Limousin "Hall of Fame".

Their first Limousin Production Sale was in 1989. They offered 100 bulls and 100 females to a packed sale facility on their farm. Bulls that were raised produced industry leading sires which include Pack Leader, Rambler and Craftsman, plus many others.

Leonard passed away in 2003; however, Wulf Cattle continued to be a Limousin leader producing genetics for better carcass yields and choice quality. Four of his boys continued the Wulf operation and the production sales have continued to grow every year.

In 2012, the Wulfs made a business decision to partner with their longtime neighbors and business associates, the Fehrs, to form the Riverview LLP /Wulf Cattle business model.

Jerry Wulf continued his role as the vice

president of the beef cattle division of Riverview LLP. Today,

Wulf Cattle feeds more than 100,000 Limousin and Limousin-cross cattle in one of their three feedlots and also send many to custom lots in South Dakota, Colorado, Nebraska and Texas. Jerry stated that 95 percent of their cattle procurement is purchased inside the country.

They also pioneered and feed several thousand Limousin x Jersey/Holstein calves for the retail market. The Wulfs also supply a very large percent of the natural market for Tyson Food and a large supply of Beef Builders to Cargill and other processors.

Today Jerry Wulf, along with two brothers, Dennis and Dave, and four grandchildren, are involved in the Wulf Cattle operation. Jerry is serving a third term on the NALF Board of Directors. He is now a consultant and advisor for Wulf Cattle, which is the beef segment of Riverview LLP.

In 2012, Casey Fanta came aboard as seedstock manager. The bull development center is now on their Sandy Ridge Ranch located near Atkinson, Nebraska.

## Receiving Cattle Nutrition: 4 Keys to Success

Well begun is half done. This old idiom could be restated, "a calf well started is half finished."

If done well, the receiving program sets cattle up for a successful closeout. However, if done poorly, it can set the cattle back so there is no catching up.

So, what are the keys to a successful receiving program? There are some standard, time-tested concepts that have been around for decades and there are also some new concepts and ideas to consider.

Regardless of concepts or strategies, this is the period where the nutritionist and veterinarian need to be on the same page. Many of the factors that determine the optimum receiving program also influence decisions on their health protocol.

Here are a few ideas to consider:

 Evaluate the level of stress of the cattle. Are the cattle high-risk calves that have been potentially exposed to respiratory disease organisms? Have they been pre-weaned or will that happen in the feedlot? Have they been previously vaccinated?

The higher the risk and exposure the more likely feed intake will be less. Research by Texas A&M University demonstrated that high-risk calves may take 30 days to reach a normal feed intake level even when healthy. Sick calves took longer. These calves may require 3-4 weeks on a constant receiving ration before stepping up to a finishing ration. However, since their initial intake is lower, they can

and should be fed a higher energy ration. This may be counter intuitive to programs that would feed them more roughage.

- Rather than adding cattle to "build a pen," isolate new cattle as much as your facilities will allow. More, smaller pens with plenty of bunk space are ideal for receiving pens. This not only helps reduce disease spread but allows for more specialized bunk and nutritional management specific to a group.
- Protein requirements are generally higher for receiving cattle. Natural protein sources are better choices than urea because their energy intake is often too low to utilize highly degradable protein sources. A ration balancing program that considers protein type and requirement like the BRANDS program can help you navigate this.

Mineral and vitamin requirements can be higher for receiving cattle but don't overdo it. Overfeeding a mineral can tie up other minerals and have adverse performance side effects.

Feed additives like ionophores and coccidiostats may be needed. Only use medicated feed additives that have been proven safe and effective and cleared for use by the FDA. Other "natural feed additives" have no such FDA approval requirement. For these products, always ask for unbiased (hopefully peer reviewed) research to support the performance claim and always consult your nutritionist.





## A Producer's Guide For Judicious Use of Antimicrobials



- Prevent problems: Emphasize appropriate husbandry and hygiene, routine health examinations and vaccinations.
- Select and use antibiotics carefully: Consult with your veterinarian on the selection and use of antibiotics. Have a valid reason to use an antibiotic. Therapeutic alternatives should be considered prior to using antimicrobial therapy.
- Avoid using antibiotics important in human medicine as first line therapy: Avoid
  using as the first antibiotic those medications that are important to treating
  strategic human or animal infections.
- Use the laboratory to help you select antibiotics: Cultures and susceptibility test results should be used to aid in the selection of antimicrobials, whenever possible.
- Combination antibiotic therapy is discouraged: Unless there is clear evidence the specific practice is beneficial, select and dose an antibiotic to affect a cure.
- Avoid inappropriate antibiotic use: Confine therapeutic antimicrobial use to proven clinical indications, avoiding inappropriate uses such as for viral infections without bacterial complication.
- Treatment programs should reflect best use principles: Regimens for therapeutic antimicrobial use should be optimized using current pharmacological information and principles.
- Treat the fewest number of animals possible: Limit antibiotic use to sick or atrisk animals.
- Treat for the recommended time period: To minimize the potential for bacteria to become resistant to antimicrobials.
- Avoid environmental contamination with antibiotics: Steps should be taken to minimize antimicrobials reaching the environment through spillage, contaminated ground run off or aerosolization.
- Keep records of antibiotic use: Accurate records of treatment and outcome should be used to evaluate therapeutic regimens and always follow proper withdrawal times.
- Follow label directions: Follow label instructions and never use antibiotics other than as labeled without a valid veterinary prescription.
- Extra-label antibiotic use must follow FDA regulations: Prescriptions, including extra label use of medications must meet the Animal Medicinal Drug Use Clarification Act (AMDUCA) amendments to the Food, Drug, and Cosmetic Act and its regulations. This includes having a valid Veterinary/Client/Patient Relationship (VCPR).
