# Make Sure Bulls Are Ready for the Breeding Season



Make sure bulls are physically and reproductively sound before the breeding season, says University of Missouri Extension livestock specialist Patrick Davis.

"Performing a bull breeding soundness exam (BSE) prior to the breeding season ensures bulls are fertile and physically sound at turnout," said Davis in a university news release. "Using bulls with unacceptable fertility and physical soundness can result in poor cow herd conception rates, which hurts cattle operation productivity and profitability."

With limited feed resources in the summer and fall, it is important to evaluate and make sure bulls are in proper energy status as they enter the breeding season, he said. Energy status is evaluated by body condition score (BCS), which ranks cattle fat cover on a scale of 1 to 9, with 1 being emaciated and 9 being obese. Low energy status can affect the bull's fertility and ability to breed females. Bulls need to have a 6 BSC, which is a smooth appearance of fat cover, prior to turnout for a successful breeding season.

Bulls need to be structurally sound to succeed during the breeding season, Davis said. One measurement used to assess bull structural soundness is foot scoring. Two components of foot scoring are the claw set and foot angle. These components are ranked on a 1 to 9 scale, with 5 being ideal. Bulls that range from

3 to 7 on the two components have adequate soundness. Since bulls travel a great distance during the breeding season, make sure bulls are evaluated and are acceptable in claw set and foot angle prior to turnout, he said.

During the BSE, remember to vaccinate bulls and treat them for internal and external parasites. This helps ensure the bulls are healthy and do not pass diseases or parasites to the rest of the cow herd. Consult your veterinarian and develop a bull vaccination plan that can be implemented during the exam.

According to University of Arkansas Extension, one in five bulls fail a breeding soundness exam. At BSE clinics held by MU Extension in cooperation with Zoetis Animal Health and local veterinarians in southwestern Missouri since 2005, the range in bull deferral/failure rates was 17% to 3.2%.

"Therefore, work with your local veterinarian, get your bulls tested and evaluate your bulls based on what has been discussed," Davis said. "Identify low-fertility, poorfoot-structured bulls and replace them to help the productivity and profitability of your cattle herd. If necessary, increase supplementation now to ensure bulls have adequate body condition for the upcoming breeding season."

# **Tips for Calculating Winter Feed Costs**

Escalating costs for hay and supplements has many cattle producers concerned, especially in the face of very poor pasture conditions and limited ay supplies in some areas.

Gene Schmitz of the University of Missouri explained that current feed costs have been run through the university Extension Beef Cow Feed Cost Dashboard spreadsheet to estimate daily feed costs for a beef cow. The dashboard is an Excel spreadsheet that was developed to estimate winter feed costs for beef cows based on varying quality and price of hay, comparing fall and spring-calving cows and purchased vs. raised hay.

Input prices are current from a local feed supplier and Missouri Department of Agriculture estimates for hay prices of varying quality. Raised hay prices are based on 2022 MU Cropping Budget. Springcalving cows are assumed to be dry and in mid-gestation.

Those prices are: good hay, \$150 per ton; fair hay, \$125 per ton; poor hay, \$115 per ton, based on reported prices per bale and estimating a 1,200-pound bale weight.

Hay quality was classified by USDA standards for protein and total digestible nutrients (TDN).

Several diets using various ingredients were calculated within each hay quality classification to get a median supplement cost for each type of hay. Average supplement per head per day for dry spring-calving cows, including salt and mineral, was 2 pounds of supplement for good hay, 3.2 pounds of supplement for fair hay, and 5.2 pounds of supplement for poor hay. Fall-calving cows averages needing 2.8 pounds of supplement for good hay, 4.8 pounds of supplement for fair hay, and 6.3 pounds of supplement for poor hay.

The breakdown of feed costs per head per day for spring-calving cows is as follows. For purchased hay: good hay, \$2.68; fair hay, \$2.38; poor hay, \$2.48.

For raised hay, daily feed cost is estimated to be: \$1.75 for good hay, \$1.86 for fair hay, and \$2.15 for poor hay.

Fall-calving cows have higher feed costs due to lactation. Using purchased hay prices, estimates of daily feed cost are \$2.90 for good hay, \$2.68 for fair hay, and \$2.68 for poor hay. Fall-calving cows fed raised hay have estimated daily feed costs of \$1.94 for good hay, \$2.16 for fair hay, and \$2.34 for poor hay.

These feed cost estimate do not include hay waste in the calculation. Poorer-quality hay can be expected to have higher feed waste than higherquality hay, and this needs to be considered in calculating you per-head feed costs.

These calculations are based on reasonable estimates of hay quality for each hay quality classification and should be used for comparison and planning purposes only. A hay test costs about \$20 and provides information to more accurately calculate supplemental feed needs than these estimates.

These estimates are designed to give cow/calf producers a general idea of winter feed costs based on current prices. They may help with the decision to keep or sell livestock and to buy or not buy additional hay or other feed supplies.

Before making these decisions; however, producers should have a clear understanding of their feed inventories, the quality of the hay inventory, the necessity and amount of additional supplement that may be needed and the cost of feed ingredients. Weigh the potential for large amounts of waste, bringing in weed seeds and other factors before making a final decision on whether or purchased additional feed resources.

There are other implications associated with selling off cows or bred heifers, so those need to be considered as well.

- 5.) Black Elk Peak measures 7,242 feet and offers a panoramic view of four states at once; South Dakota, Montana, Wyoming, and Nebraska. You can reach the peak by hiking about a 6-mile round trip.



### Black Hills Stock Show & Sale



Any good carpenter has a wide range of tools in the toolbox to get the job done, and in much the same way, cattle producers have a vast set of options to keep disease from coming onto the farm, said the experts at the Kansas State University Beef Cattle Institute on a recent Cattle Chat podcast.

"One of the things that beef producers have in their toolbox is sanitation," veterinarian Bob Larson said in a news release.

One of the examples he shared was washing feed trucks and other vehicles that come in contact with other herds to keep them from being a vector of disease transmission.

Another tool Larson cited for livestock producers was diagnostic testing.

"Diagnostic testing works best when trying to prevent a disease in which the carrier animals are rare," he said. "With accurate testing prior to arrival, producers are able to keep diseased animals off the farm."



The third tool he mentioned is keeping the cattle in good health.

"This includes following vaccination protocols that will protect them from diseases as well as providing them with quality nutrition," Larson said.

Veterinarian Brad White offered a fourth tool – prioritizing disease prevention in your herd.

"There are costs associated with each of these prevention strategies, so producers need to prioritize the disease that brings the greatest risk to the overall health of the herd," White said.

As producers make their biosecurity plan in partnership with their veterinarian, K-State veterinarian Brian Lubbers said it is important to know the risk tolerance for the operation.

"If you have a high-value herd, isolation and testing will be important when bringing new cattle into the operation," he said. When a disease situation arises on the ranch, the veterinarians agree that rapid communication is going to be key in mitigating the situation.


"If you think you are dealing with a disease outbreak, you've got to make that phone call to your local veterinarian," Lubbers said. "I know it is a hard phone call to make, but it is a critical step in stopping disease spread."

From that phone call, the local veterinarian will investigate the situation and reach out to the state veterinarian, he added.

"There is a network of veterinarians trained specifically to spot high-consequence diseases and they will be on your farm literally within hours," Lubbers said.

While that is the worst-case scenario, Larson stressed that using the tools in the prevention toolbox will reduce the chance of these situations arising.

"The healthier you can have the environment and the cattle, the more resistant and resilient the cattle will be when faced with disease exposure," he said.



# Cattle Experts Explain Heterosis Advantage



Go to a family reunion and the keen observer can spot trait similarities in the way people look. Eye color, hair texture, face shape, etc. are just some of the features that tend to be passed through the generations.

Just as with people, cattle also pass traits to their offspring that can be measured, said the experts at Kansas State University's Beef Cattle Institute.

Speaking on a recent Cattle Chat podcast, veterinarian Bob Larson talked about heterosis (a superior genetic advantage) and trait heritability with nutritionist Phillip Lancaster.

"The more unrelated the cattle are, the greater advantage there is in heterosis," Larson said in a news release. He cited the example of a British-breed beef animal mated to a Continental-breed animal as producing a greater level of heterosis than mating two animals of the same breed.

One noted advantage of heterosis relates to feed intake. The experts cited a recent study that showed a crossbred animal's ability to maintain body weight by consuming less feed than its purebred counterpart.

"There are well-documented differences among the breeds of cattle for maintenance energy requirement," Lancaster said.

Along with feed efficiency, Larson said, crossbred cattle are more fertile than purebred cattle.

"The fertility advantages of crossbred cattle are known in both males and females," Larson said. "When you mate two animals of the same breed you are depressing the potential for reproductive efficiency compared to mating cattle of different breeds."

He added that in a 65-day breeding season, a higher percentage of the crossbred cows will be more likely to be bred than the purebred females.

"The greatest advantage of heterosis comes through traits that are lowly heritable, such as fertility, because so many genes influence reproductive efficiency," Larson said. "By contrast, highly heritable traits offer less heterosis advantages."

Genetic testing can provide a precise prediction of an individual animal's performance, said Lancaster.

"Through genetic tests, we can now estimate the heterozygosity (two different forms of a gene that is transmitted in different forms to the offspring on a 50/50 basis) of individuals based on genetic markers," Lancaster added.
