Feeding Cull Cows Could Increase Profit

Each year, cow-calf producers have a percentage of cows that are culled from the herd for various reasons. They may have been open at pregnancy check time, lost a calf, have reached a normal culling age, or faced drought conditions that forced an earlier or increased culling rate.

No matter the reason for culling, it is important to evaluate the opportunity to add value to these females at market, as they can equate to 15-30% of the annual ranch income.

Considering the normal price cycle for cull cows, the seasonal low typically occurs in November as a result of increased numbers of spring-calving cows flooding the market following weaning and pregnancy check. The seasonal high typically occurs in July, but increases are also seen in early spring (April-May), providing the opportunity to market the cows during a different time and capture additional value by feeding these cows for a period of 30 to 90 days after weaning.

Costs and benefits

There are both costs and benefits associated with feeding cows, and it is important to evaluate your individual situation to determine whether it is feasible for your operation.

Some of the questions to consider are: Do I have a pen or the pasture space to manage these cows? What feed resources can I allocate to this group? Will feeding equipment be available?



Do I have the time and labor resources to feed this group of cattle?

The potential benefits of feeding cows include three main factors: additional weight gain, which can translate into more pounds to sell; improved body condition score (BCS) and slaughter grade, which would add value; and seasonal price increase coupled with the other two factors which could further increase value.

Additional weight gain will vary based on multiple factors, specifically what condition the cows are in at the beginning of the feeding phase. Take time to evaluate each animal and determine whether they are healthy, with sound feet and legs, and in good condition. If they are not healthy, it is better to sell rather than risk her dying during the feeding phase. Only healthy cows should be fed.

Cows in a BCS of less than 6 will gain more weight faster than their more-heavily conditioned counterparts at BCS 7 or 8. The type of diet these cows are fed will also play a role in how fast they gain condition and will influence cost.

Select the cows that have the greatest opportunity to gain weight quickly and efficiently to increase slaughter grade and hit some of the seasonal price increases.

Marketing Considerations

There is a relationship between BCS and slaughter grade, which means that as BCS increases, the slaughter grade of the cattle will improve. For example, a cow in BCS 4 is considered "lean" and would be a USDA-grade "cutter." If that BCS 4 cow can be fed to reach a BCS 6, she would move into the "boner" category, which would equate to a USDA-grade "utility." The expected price increase for this improvement in grade is \$1.50 per hundred-weight (cwt).

Finally, a seasonal price increase on average is \$5 per cwt from November to February, but this is not a constant. Depending on the level of cow slaughter, this number can change, so having an understanding of the current cull cow slaughter situation is important.

Feed costs are going to be the largest expense to keeping and managing these cows to a heavier weight, which means that cows that will be less-efficient, such as the heavier conditioned cows, may not be able to put on enough weight and condition to make feeding them a profitable venture.

Research indicates that BCS at the beginning of the feeding period is a strong indicator of net returns. Cows that were in a BCS of 6 or greater at the start of the feeding period had zero or negative net return relative to revenue at culling, while cows that were in a lower BCS at the beginning of the feeding phase yielded a positive net return above revenue at culling when fed on a native pasture, but a negative net return when fed in a dry lot situation.

Evaluate your costs and projected returns to determine if feeding cull cows would be an option for your operation.






In Memoriam

Extreme Heat

The heat wave that hit Kansas in June had a large impact on feedlots in Kansas. Fat cattle were hit significantly by the climbing heat index and many perished. There was a report of over 10,000 head of cattle who died due to the heat.

As temperatures rise, it becomes increasingly difficult for cattle to lose heat. When humidity increases it becomes more difficult to evaporate the water from the skin surface. Heat stress is a concern for cattle producers, and efforts need to be made to mitigate heat stress prior to extreme heat events, including providing extra water, altering feeding schedules and rations.

Veterinarian Miles Theurer said that it was a "perfect storm". Crews worked non-stop to provide extra water and bedding for the livestock.







Herman Symens – In Memoriam



Herman Symens, 82, of Sisseton, South Dakota, passed away July 16, 2022, after a long illness. He was a pioneer in the Limousin breed and a true friend of Limousin breeders, spending four decades breeding, feeding and promoting the cattle he loved.

He graduated from Amherst High School in 1957. He attended South Dakota State College of Agriculture and received a diploma in 1959.

Herman started with Limousin in 1970 when he and his brothers, Irwin, Paul and John, began raising this new breed of cattle, Limousin, at Symens Brothers near Amherst, South Dakota. They were leaders in Limousin genetics, exhibiting many grand champion Limousin bulls at shows like the National Western Stock Show, Black Hills Stock Show and the South Dakota State Fair.

Herman, his wife, Judy, and their sons moved from Amherst to Sisseton,

South Dakota, in 1993 where they raised cattle at Symens Hills Ranch. They also owned and operated LIMI-Gene, Inc., a semen distribution company created in 1989 with the vision of providing the Limousin breed with a source of quality genetics.

This great cattleman was not only actively involved raising Limousin cattle, but he also played a major role in the growth, development and acceptance of the breed. He served on the North American



Limousin Foundation (NALF) Board of Directors from 1978 to 1984, serving as president of the association for two years in 1983 and 1984. He was held in high esteem by nearly all the seedstock producers of the Limousin breed. He was also a founding member and on the Board of Directors of the Heartland Limousin Association for many years.

Herman was on the South Dakota Limousin Board of Directors, serving as president for several years. He judged many national junior and open shows in the United States and Canada.

He was a great supporter of all breeders, both young and old. He traveled across the country as well as internationally, buying and selling cattle as well as exhibiting at many prestigious shows. Breeders sought out Herman for his opinion and advice on Limousin cattle. Mark Anderson, NALF Executive Director, said at his "Hall of Fame" induction, "Herman is considered a true friend of Limousin breeders, and he is a committed promoter of the breed. He has had a love of the breed and the people for more than 40 years, and he is passionate about the attributes of Limousin cattle."

Herman has received many honors over the years. In 2015, he was inducted into the North American Limousin Foundation "Hall of Fame", becoming the fifth Limousin breeder/promoter to achieve that high honor. At his induction ceremony, several Limousin producers from South Dakota, Minnesota and North Dakota spoke to his true dedication to agriculture and the Limousin breed. Dean Summerbell, Executive Secretary of the Heartland Limousin Association, said he thought Herman Symens forgot more about Limousin cattle than most producers will ever know.

In 2019, Herman retired due to ill health, and he and Judy moved from the ranch into Sisseton.

Herman is survived by his wife of 59 years, Judy; sons Jim (Laura) of Claresholm, Alberta; and Joel (Gerlyn) of the Philippines; daughters Julie Symens of Sisseton; and Janelle (Brett) Symens of Aberdeen, South Dakota, and seven grandchildren; Leah (Justin) Hanson, Lexi (James) and Dillon (Annalesha) Bohlander, Colton, Cheyenne, and Colby Symens, and John Symens, one great-grandson Jhett Hanson; brothers David Symens, Paul (Faye) Symens, John (Shirley) Symens; sisters Aletha Prouty, Karen (Darrel) Jongeling, Doris Armstrong; sisters-inlaw Cleo Symens, Betty (John) Kendall, Nancy Herzog; brother-in-law Craig Schmidle, and many other relatives and friends.





Tips on Keeping Cattle Feeding Areas Clean

Recent rains in some areas of the Midwest and rising temperatures have led to a need for cattle producers to clean feeding areas, says K-State livestock specialist Joel DeRouchey.

- Pull manure out of areas where it has accumulated.
- Make sure drainage areas are clear.
- Remove manure from the pens and consider using it as a fertilizer source.
- Repack and rebuild mounds, if utilized.

DeRouchey said cleaning pens after the winter and spring months is important even during the busy summertime, especially if the area is used for continuous feeding.

"Once we get some dryness in the pens, we want to pull the extra manure, and get drainage back to where it needs to go to help dry those pens out faster," DeRouchey said. "All of a sudden, the pens are super muddy, and we want to get in and clean. One of the problems with that is we often take a lot of the soil."

Trying to clean before the pens are dry can lead to pulling soil that will eventually have to be replaced by more soil. DeRouchey said producers can reduce labor and expense by waiting until the pens are dry.

"It's very important to get that manure removed, especially in those operations that are feeding cattle, because of fly production," DeRouchey said.

Flies like moist areas and organic matter—and manure and rain provide a great environment for larva to grow. If pens are not cleaned in a timely matter, the production of flies will increase and have a negative effect on the cattle.

"The same principle applies in areas where we have additional manure and feed that was wasted or simply not consumed by the animals," DeRouchey said. "Those areas will provide perfect breeding grounds for fly production and anything we can do to scrape and mound it has a significant impact in producing less flies."

How Do Genetic Values Apply to My Herd Goals?

E ach bull you purchase should be evaluated on the basis of what genetic potential he has to offer to your specific operation. The purchase of bulls should be viewed as an investment in genetics. The profit potential of your operation is largely dependent on bull selection. Over time, 80-90% of genetic change is the result of sire selection. So, as we evaluate bulls, how do we determine what genetic values are important to our operation?

Use the Following Steps to Analyze Your Production System and Establish Breeding Goals.

Evaluate your current level of herd performance. You need to measure in order to identify what traits need to be improved. Some examples:

- Percent Calves Born Un-assisted/Calf Vigor
- Mature Cow Weight
- Percent Pregnancy Rate
- Percent Calf Crop Weaned
- Weaning Weight
- Weaning Weight Per Exposed Female
- Yearling Weight
- Carcass Weights, Quality and Yield Grades

Consider Your Marketing Program

Are you selling weaned calves, yearlings, finished cattle or replacement heifers? Are you using bulls as terminal sires or selecting heifers to develop as herd replacements?

Identify Your Selection Goals

Once you have quantified levels of performance in your herd, established your marketing plan and how you will use bulls, it determines what traits are most economically important, what changes are needed and where efficiencies can be gained. Selection pressure is a precious commodity and should be focused on genetic change that gives your operation the greatest profit potential.

Evaluate Your Herd Bulls' Genetic Values

You need to evaluate the genetic values of your herd bulls that resulted in your current performance levels. EPDs and \$Values are comparable across time and geography. A registration paper has value. Virtually all beef registries have a pedigree search option available online which can be used, free of charge to look up the current genetic values of the bulls you have been using. These genetic values can be equated to your current levels of herd performance to guide future bull buying decision.




