Reproducers to get back to the basics of farming, says University of Missouri Extension agronomist Terry Halleran. "Practice standard farming practices to rebuild pastures following drought," he says in an Extension news release.

States in the Heartland area, including Missouri, have suffered through a drought for the past several years.

"Prepare for a problem before it occurs," Halleran says. If you don't "you are going to be feeding high dollar hay," he says. If you prepare and there's no drought, you've lost nothing.

One way to prepare is to "get out of your tractor or pickup" to look at pastures, he says. Walk pastures and

look for weak areas. Post-drought pastures may need time to recover. Expect weakened stands, thin pastures and lower supplies after drought. Also, expect more weeds.

Be patient – Practice patience when turning cows out onto fresh pastures. Wait until grass is 6-10 inches tall in rotational grazing systems and don't allow cows to graze plants lower than two inches.

Don't be too patient – Get the most out of your hay crop by baling before July. Don't wait too long to frost-seed legumes into pastures. Plant coolseason grasses in the fall. Control weeds so that spring forages can compete against weed pressure.

Act – Make honest calculations and then act. Many producers don't know the yield of their pastures and don't allow enough acreage per cow.

Prevent waste – Invest in good storage methods and facilities, especially a storage facility for hay, says Halleran, and keep a two-year supply on hand to prepare for drought. "It's not about a better truck or a better tractor," he says, "It's about a hay barn."

Test – Before you fertilize, take a soil test. Look at fertilizer options. "Nitrogen isn't the only fertilizer for sale," Haleran says. Lime pastures if the test calls for it, and be patient. Lime takes four to six months to activate. Drag pastures to spread nutrients from manure piles across the pasture.

Plan – Plant cool season grasses in the fall. It is late in the season to seed frost-seed legumes into pastures, but plan for next year. Choose droughtresistant grasses. Match stocking rates to feed supply estimates.

Don't guess – Know yields of your tall fescue pastures, says Halleran. Most producers don't have an accurate estimate of yields. They also likely overestimate their usable acreage by not deducting woods, fence lines, ditches, etc., where forages can't be harvested. Vol. 31 • Issue 3 • May/Jun 2023

Tam writing this column during the last week of March in order to satisfy the publishing deadline for the Heart Beat. It is a challenge because both the printer and the postal service need quite a bit of time to get the paper printed and delivered in a timely fashion. It has been frustrating!

I am looking forward to seeing green grass, and hopefully, our 18 inches of snow that is still on the ground will disappear in the next couple of weeks. Although the melt in Minnesota is slow; thereby reducing giant flood possibilities, the 112-day snow cover is enough for even Minnesotans to get "snow weary". Winter has a way of creating breakdowns and unexpected repairs.

As I write this column, our car has had a tough couple of months. On the way from Wetonka, South Dakota, to Fargo, North Dakota, February 11, I had my choice of hitting at least 100 deer crossing Highway 46 near Fort Ransom, North Dakota. I almost got away free and clear, but the last deer decided it could beat me across the road. Our front end on the passenger side needs a new cosmetic fix to the right front fender and bumper. I did not realize that material was so expensive to replace. Nobody was hurt, but car can't be fixed until the last week in April. Thank goodness for duct tape that can hold the broken pieces together.

Beverly, on the other hand, also had some major car problems. She was not able to shift the car into the park position becuase it was stuck in neutral. Buyer attendance has been exceptional at many of the sales, despite the weather. Red bulls are again popular north of I-80. Cow prices have improved, especially in the western region of the Heartland, reflecting a solid herd restoration from the sell-off due to drought conditions.

We hope the late bull buying season will be even stronger because of increased moisture. The national weather service continues to eliminate drought conditions in the extreme northern climates. Pockets of drought conditions remain in the western and southern areas.

We are looking forward to the Heartland Showdown (formally the Regional) show at the Westfair Fairgrounds in Council Bluffs, Iowa, the first weekend in June. Be sure to enter as early as possible. We have not designated any hotels as headquarters because there are so many, in a variety of price ranges, in close proximity to the fairgrounds. Information about how to enter was printed in the March/ April issue of the Heart Beat as well as this issue.

Good luck to all junior exhibitors who will take part in their state field days, Heartland Showdown, the NALJA show in Rapid City, and the State Fair open, FFA and 4-H events. We hope to see you down the road this summer.



Three Layer Chocolate Cream Pie



I love anything chocolate, and this three layer chocolate pie recipe is easy to make and delicious. I hope you enjoy it! *Bev Summerbell*

For the Crust:

¹/₂ cup (1 stick) butter, melted
1 cup all-purpose flour
³/₄ cup pecans, finely chopped
¹/₄ cup brown sugar

For the Cream Cheese Layer:

8 oz. cream cheese, at room temperature 2 tablespoons heavy cream ½ cup powdered sugar

For the Chocolate Layer:

- 1 box instant chocolate pudding
- 1 box instant chocolate fudge pudding 1 ³/₄ cup milk


For the Topping:

½ cup heavy cream2 tablespoons powdered sugar½ cup pecan halves

Preparation:

- 1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees.
- 2. In medium bowl, stir together melted butter, flour, pecans, and brown sugar.
- 3. Press mixture into bottom and up the sides of a 9-inch pie pan and bake until crust begins to brown around the edges, 15-20 minutes. Let cool completely.
- 4. In clean bowl, beat cream cheese, ½ cup powdered sugar and heavy cream with electric mixer until smooth. Spread onto cooled crust.
- 5. In separate bowl, combine the pudding mixes and milk and allow to set for 5 minutes. Spread thickened pudding over cream cheese mixture and place in refrigerator to chill until set, at least 4 hours.
- 6. When ready to serve, make the topping by beating the heavy cream and powdered sugar until soft peaks form. Spread over chocolate pudding layer and top with pecans. Enjoy!



Curtis was introduced to using Limousin bulls in 1996. It all started when he purchased 240 acres of pasture. At the time, he was not sure of the best way to stock the pasture; however, a neighbor, Marilyn Moore of R&M Limousin, contacted him about taking care of the R&M herd. Curtis managed that herd until 2009.

Splitting time between Offutt Air Force base in Bellevue, Nebraska, and the farm to manage a Limousin herd of cows, Curtis again was called to duty in 2003. He was deployed and served in the Iraqi Freedom Operation for 14 months. Curtis was promoted to Command Sergeant Major and commanded a battalion as part of Operation Enduring Freedom in Afghanistan in 2012.

Curtis returned home and began farming again after his military career. The McClellans purchased a herd of 100 first-calf, black Angus heifers in Montana and brought them to Iowa. He chose to breed the heifers to a Limousin bull because of their feedlot efficiency, dressed yield percentage and improved docility. He was pleased with the temperament of the Limousin cattle. He has purchased several Limousin bulls from Vorthmann Limousin of Treynor, Iowa, since 2015 and also from Bosch Limousin of Indianola, Iowa.

The couple currently row crop 270 acres and care for a 110 head cow/ calf herd. They market their calves at the Dunlap Livestock Auction in Dunlap, Iowa. They also maintain a direct sale program for 10% of their fed cattle, butchering at the Atlantic Lockers in Atlantic, Iowa.



The brothers moved on to other careers; however, they said that they missed the farm-raised, locallyprocessed meat they grew up with and liked. Nearly two decades after the plant burned, they opened a small facility to process their own meat. Grants through the Missouri Department of Agriculture and Small Business Development Authority helped them expand the business.

Currently, the facility at Vernon County Meats is about 1,000 square feet. They are in the process of tripling the square footage, which will include the addition of a retail storefront.

Part of what they did years ago, and are now planning to do, is market to restaurants a high-quality product with great taste, tenderness, and flavor like an old-time butcher shop.

Monty raises Limousin cattle and his brother, Leon, is also a cattleman. They said they never imagined the idea processing their own beef would become a business.

Experts Discuss How to Add Females to a Cow Herd

In looking at the shifting amounts of money in retirement accounts, it is easy to see that markets run in cycles. In much the same way, the size of the beef cattle operation shifts in response to several factors including market demand, feed availability, and other things, say the experts at Kansas State University's Beef Cattle Institute.

Looking towards a time when beef producers are ready to expand the herd, the experts say there are three types of females that may best fit the operation. Speaking on a recent Cattle Chat podcast the experts outlined the pros and cons for adding each of these to the herd.

The three groupings of females they discussed were open heifers (nonpregnant females who have never calved), bred heifers (pregnant females carrying their first calf) and cow-calf pairs (cows sell with the calf at its side and the cow is either pregnant or open). These are all replacements for cows that were sold during the herd reduction phase, say the experts. "In most operations, the open females are the most difficult to manage because of the labor that is involved in getting them bred and no assurance that she will be able to conceive," veterinarian Brian Lubbers said.

However, veterinarian Bob Larson added that the advantage of the open females is that they can be bred to calve on the timeline set by the herd she enters.

"By adding an open heifer, I pick the breeding season and they fit into my system quicker than with the other options," Larson said.

The pros/cons with the other two options are financial, said Lubbers.

"The trade-offs with breds and pairs relate to costs; bred cows are the middle-ground option, while cow/calf pairs are less work to manage but come at a higher cost," Lubbers said. "The advantage of a more mature cow is that it is likely she will get pregnant again in the next cycle."

When looking at those other two options, Larson said it is important to consider the timing of when they will calve and how that matches with the rest of the herd the potential purchaser is calving out. "Ranchers adding cow/calf pairs and even bred heifers need to be disciplined to buy the females that fit into their calving window," Larson said.

Veterinarian Brad White agreed but added there is an exception.

"The cow/calf pairs don't have to match my calving season perfectly. If they calve earlier than the rest of my herd, it will be easy for me to get them to breed back at a time that will fit with the rest of the herd in the next breeding season," White said.

Regardless of which option producers opt to follow, agricultural economist Dustin Pendell offered this advice: "Each operation is going to be different so sit down and pencil out the expected expenses for each of these options to know which one is going to be best from an economic standpoint."

White encouraged producers to consider purchasing replacement females as a long-term strategy.

"I am not adding these females just for a year or two, but rather I need to find ones that fit my environment and add value for many years to come," he said.

- 1. The first pre-organizational meeting for NALF was held May, 1968, in Denver, Colorado.
- 2. The first Executive Vice-President of NALF was Richard "Dick" Goff. He served in that position from 1968 to January of 1972.
- 3. The first national sale was held in January of 1971 in Denver, Colorado. Dudley Thompson of Hampton, Iowa, sold a half-blood that topped the sale at \$10,000.
- 4. The first state Limousin association to be organized was Oklahoma followed by Texas in May of 1971. Also, in May of that year, South Dakota and Nebraska were in the process of forming state associations. Kansas and Missouri scheduled meetings at that same time for the purpose of starting associations in their states.
- 5. The first President of NALF was Bob Purdy of Buffalo, Wyoming. He served as president from 1968-1971.
- 6. Gloria Jennings of Highmore, South Dakota, was not only the first president of the North American Limousin Junior Association from 1971-1974, but she was also the first Limousin Queen. She was crowned in May of 1971 at the Red Carpet Show and Sale in Huron, South Dakota.
- 7. Dee Jones of Sperry, Oklahoma, received the first Limouselle scholarship in 1978. That association is now known as the "Limi Boosters".




