#### "Winter Cow Syndrome" Puts Older Cows at Risk

inter cow syndrome" is a term used to describe individual cows or groups of cows that experience a significant decline in body weight and condition over the winter – sometimes becoming extremely thin, even to the point of death.

The cause is usually due to a combination of factors including physical factors of the cow(s), feed quantity and characteristics, and weather.

Cows greater than 10 years of age tend to be at higher risk for "winter cow syndrome" because some cows in this age group will have "broken mouths" or no teeth. While these cows may be able to maintain body weight when grazing growing forage, they are at risk of losing weight on dormant forage or hay.

In addition, heifers that are still growing have greater energy needs than mature cows and are also at risk for winter cow syndrome.

Cows with other disease problems such as pneumonia, liver disease, or severe parasitism (lice or intestinal worms) increase their risk for winter cow syndrome.

Feed quality is an important factor contributing to winter cow syndrome. Many extremely thin cows have a rumen full of poorly digestible forage. Mature dormant forage or hay harvested when the plant was mature tends to have a high lignin content, low protein and low available calories.



Because high-Lignin/low-protein forages have a very slow passage rate through the digestive tract, cows eating these types of forages are able to consume only about one-half to two-thirds that number of pounds of forage per day compared to cows eating higher-quality forage. This combination of low intake and low available energy per pound of feed can easily result in cows losing weight very rapidly even when eating all they can consume.

#### Vitamin Deficiencies

In addition, mature forages are often borderline to deficient in phosphorus, occasionally deficient in calcium, and also low in vitamin A. Calcium content of many types of grass decreases somewhat as forage matures and becomes dormant but usually maintains levels that supply dietary needs throughout the year. However, by midwinter phosphorus levels in forage can decrease greatly, particularly for some types of forage.

The content of both calcium and phosphorus in forage is not the only important variable – intake also plays a critical role. When forage is dormant or of poor quality and intake is decreased, phosphorus and calcium intake can drop below minimum levels even when cows are grazing what appears to be adequate forage according to laboratory analysis.

Vitamin A is the vitamin most likely to be deficient in cattle diets, and although carotene (which is converted to vitamin A) is plentiful in green, growing forage; large losses take place in the curing and storage of roughages. Particularly, hay cut in the seed stage and exposed to rain or to extended periods of sunshine prior to baling has lost most of the carotene content.

While it is true that while grazing green forages, cattle can store vitamin A in the liver for two to four months, cows consuming dormant forage or poor-quality hay for several months can deplete these reserves.



Tcan't believe after 110 issues of the Heart Beat, we are on the last two issues to put together. There will be some reminiscing about sales and events that Beverly and I covered in this issue of the Heart Beat. I am still adjusting to the idea that the time has come for someone who is younger and healthier to pick up the Heartland banner and continue the service to our members and readers promoting Limousin cattle. ooking back over my years in this role, the major change I have seen is the improvement of Limousin genetics in the breed's characteristics. Whether we are looking at Fullblood, Purebred or Lim-Flex genetics, what a difference in structure, docility and yield grade from our breed makeup in 2001 to the present time.

From my standpoint, the biggest change is the improved docility. In 2001, the Limousin reputation was a wild, pencil-gutted animal that was considered too risky to have. That reputation is no longer valid; although it is hard to convince some of our older ranchers we achieved a number one rating for docility. From many Limousin bulls twenty years ago who would love to put your body over the fence to now loving to have their back scratched, that change has improved ease of handling and better carcasses at harvest time.

HAPPY NEW YEAR

In 2001, our yield grade was Select or Standard for the most part, with a small percentage reaching the Choice evaluation. Now Standard grade is no longer a concern. Our percentage of Choice is now the majority with even some Prime carcasses. Our improved marbling is a major factor in our overall carcass evaluation. Our ability to grade Choice and maintain a higher yield is ideal. Although we probably have a decrease in muscle percentage from what we had, we have had better acceptance in the commodity market. In my opinion, (just my opinion), we do not need to lose any more muscle in Limousin-crossed calves. Red meat yield is an advantage in the Limousin breed.

When it comes to structure, Limousin cattle have increased rib size and depth. Maybe we have lost some efficiency in feeding, but it still is an advantage in the feed lot.

Beef prices are the highest they have been. In short, for the commercial producer, good times are here for the beef industry. Unfortunately, our good prices have been generated in part by our decline in the cattle population thanks to the drought in the Midwest states. Disturbing reports of the number of higher than usual open cows after pregnancy checks are troubling. It will be very interesting to find out what might be responsible for the high open rate, some rising to 50% of some herds.

In closing, I want to *thank* all members and readers for their outstanding support of the Heartland Limousin Association. We will always owe a debt of gratitude to the Limousin breeders for their acceptance of Beverly and me. Good luck in the future endeavors of the breed and its users.

#### **Temperature Concerns**

Cows are able to withstand cold winter temperatures as long as they have a dry winter haircoat and adequate body fat. Cows in adequate body condition with a dry haircoat will start to require additional energy to maintain their body temperature when the windchill drops below freezing (32° F) until the cows adapt to the lower temperature in general, about 1% more energy for each 1° F below freezing.

For example, if the windchill averages 20° F over several days, cows with a dry winter haircoat will require 12% more energy than cows exposed to temperatures above freezing.

The greatest weather stress occurs if hair becomes wet or mud-caked - in which case, the critical temperature rises to about 59° F and cows require 1 to 2% more energy for each degree of windchill below 59° F. In this situation, an average windchill of 20° F results in cows needing about 40 to 80% more energy just to maintain their current weight.

When intake cannot meet this requirement, body fat will be mobilized to supply the deficient energy.

Prolonged periods of exposure to low windchill temperatures (especially if the haircoat is not dry) coupled with poor-quality forage where intake physically cannot be increased, results in rapid weight loss. If cows are thin to start with, the combination of poorquality forage and low environmental temperatures will lead to extremely thin cows that may be low in phosphorous and vitamin A (and potentially other nutrients) and these cows are often unable to rise (i.e. downer cow).

The likelihood that a downer cow due to winter cow syndrome can return to health and productivity is low to very low depending on the severity of the weight loss, the current level of environmental stress, and the availability of high-quality forages and supplements.

#### **Management Strategies**

The best strategy to prevent winter cow syndrome is two-fold. First, "mouth" and body condition score the cows in the fall and cull any gummer and broken mouth cows and separate thin cows and feed them so that they gain weight and are in adequate condition by the start of colder weather.

Second, have a good forage management and winter supplementation plan that results in cows that maintain adequate body condition throughout the year.

On native range, dormant winter forage will likely need protein supplementation to ensure adequate intake and digestibility of mature

plants. In addition, energy may need to be supplemented during periods of cold stress.

The amount and type of winter supplementation of hay will depend on the quality of the hay being fed. Cows consuming high-quality hay may require no additional supplementation. However, if the hay has adequate protein, an emphasis on energy supplementation may be required during periods of environmental stress.

If low-protein hay is being fed, protein may need to be supplemented

For herds that calve starting in late winter or early spring, late winter coincides with the last 50 days of gestation and the early post-calving period. Cows in late gestation require about 1.8 pounds of protein per day and about 11.3 mega-calories of energy (if not cold-stressed).

Once cows start lactating, their protein and energy requirement increases dramatically. Early lactation cows will require about 2.5 pounds of protein per day and about 16.4 megacalories of energy.

Cows can be supplemented with a variety of feeds with the best feed for a particular situation depending on cost, availability and ease of handling. Goodquality grass or legume hay, by-product feeds such as wheat mids, corn gluten feed, distillers grains, or soy hulls, commodities such as corn or whole soybeans, and commercial cubes or tubs are all potential winter supplements.

Regardless of the source, the total diet of forage and supplement should supply adequate energy, protein, salt, phosphorus and calcium.

In addition to a good forage management and supplementation plan, it is wise to have contingency plans for thin cows as well as for extreme weather events. If you identify some cows that have lost body condition during the winter, they should be separated from the herd and fed a higher energy diet. In addition, extra feed should be available for periods of extended cold temperatures to avoid excessive weight loss.

#### Leih Limousin Inducted into ILA "Hall of Fame"

Ed, Bill and Dave Leih, Leih Limousin, of New Virginia, Iowa, were inducted posthumously into the Iowa Limousin Association "Hall of Fame" on November 11, 2023. The ceremony took place during the ILA meeting and banquet at the Iowa Cattlemen's Building in Ames.

They were recognized for their long-time commitment to raising, promoting and selling Limousin cattle, not only as seedstock producers but also with youth within their community. Leih Limousin was a father and son duo – Edward (1924-2015), William "Bill" (1950-2013) and David (1952-2019). Beyond those three, Leih Limousin eventually expanded to include children and grandchildren.

Leih Limousin was started in the late

1970s with the purchase of two bulls from a sale in Pierre, South Dakota. In 1981, Bill bought a show heifer for his daughter, Michelle, for her to show at the fair. From the original purchase of bulls, the Leihs were believers in Limousin genetics, and each spent their lifetime raising and promoting Limousin cattle.

They had loyal bull customers that learned to contact them early to ensure they got the bulls they needed for the breeding season. Leih Limousin also raised and sold natural cattle to Laura's Lean Beef.

Bill and Dave were both actively involved in the Warren County Fair, serving as the Market and Breeding Beef Superintendents respectively. Dave had cattle at the Warren County Fair for 56 years, whether it was his own kids, the neighborhood kids or his grandchildren showing the cattle. They enjoyed attending Limousin cattle shows, especially when all six of their grandchildren were in the show ring together.

In 2008, Leih Limousin competed in the Iowa State Fair Super Bull Contest. The "Warden" bull, weighing in at 2,902 lbs. placed second in the contest, just a few pounds less than the winning Charolais bull.






The Minors raise Purebred, Fullblood, Percentage and Lim-Flex genetics. They held their first online sale last March, offering a group of elite females.

#### **Forage Tests Lead to Feed Savings**

In the midst of ever-increasing input costs cattlemen might ask the question "Why should I test forages?" We'd argue that 2023-24 is exactly the time to test forages, when feed supplies are tight and high priced, and input costs keep going up.

The first step is to properly sample your forage supply. Each cutting and each field should be sampled separately, since stage of growth, fertilizer programs and plant species all impact forage quality. Next, be sure to use a core sampler and collect samples from at least 10 or more bales per lot and at least 10-12 inches directly into the bale to be representative of the whole bale. Place all bale cores into a bucket, mix up well, and pull a subsample to submit to the lab.

As you collect samples, make a forage inventory of the number of bales from each lot. You will need this to evaluate and create a winter-feeding plan.

This is also a good time to determine what other feeds you have access to or are willing to purchase. Corn stover, corn grain, distillers' grains, gluten feed, soy hulls and soybean meal all are alternatives to consider.

When comparing, price options on a per pound of dry nutrient delivered. For example. Corn priced at \$5/bu.delivered can be fairly compared only to another fee as \$1.35/lbs. of crude protein dry matter, or \$9.13/lb. of TDN, dry matter.

Once you receive your forage analysis results, work with your nutritionist to develop rations that meet the specific needs of each group of cattle at each stage of production. Early winter requirements of spring-calving mature cows might be met by medium-quality hay and corn stover, while developing heifers will need better quality hay and likely some additional energy and maybe some protein. By late winter, higher-quality hay and additional energy likely will be needed.

The only way to accurately know how much additional protein or energy is needed is to test your hay.

In years with short forage supply, alternative feeds like corn stover or CRP hay can help stretch the forage supply, but only if you know the nutrient analysis of the forage. High fiber levels or low digestible fiber often will benefit from the addition of some ruminally digestible protein, so the microbes digest more fiber. A small amount of distiller's grains, corn gluten feed and soybean meal will improve this efficiency.

The higher the fiber content of a feed, the slower it is digested, ultimately limiting cow intake. In general, on a forage analysis, NDF will be an indicator of dry matter intake while ADF is an indicator of energy value.

Finally, testing typically can help reduce total feed costs by better balancing the cows needs with the forage quality available, even if additional supplemental feeds are needed. For example, a medium-size cow with winter hair coat and some wind protection in November and December and free-choice access to hay will use 42 lbs. of grass hay (\$100/ton) per day at 25% waste and a cost of \$2.21/day. However, if you provide 20 lbs. corn stover (\$90/ton) at 30% waste with 20 lbs. of the same hay at 25% waste plus a half-pount of distillers grains (\$200/ton), you can feed her for \$2.02/day.

The bottom line is the small investment in forage testing can return dividends in feed savings, better cow performance, and ration accuracy.

#### Winter Care of Bulls Key for Next Season

All things considered, the working season for a herd bull is relatively short, with an active breeding season of 60 to 90 days for most producers.

When winter weather moves in, and the bulls are pulled from the cow herd, it is imperative to manage herd bulls properly to prevent frostbite of the testes and properly manage body condition score before the next breeding season.

Bull management strategies during the winter months can impact a bull's performance in the upcoming breeding season.

#### Frostbite

Frostbite presents as a scab, discoloration and/or sloughing of the bull's scrotum. This tissue damage limits or prevents the ability for a bull to regulate testis temperature.

Come breeding season, this can result in a decrease in fertility.

Dry areas to lay are important to consider when wintering bulls. These areas can be achieved by

providing bedding or areas within a pasture that provide adequate cover from wind and snow. Wet and cold conditions increase the risk of frostbite.

#### Nutrition

Nutrition of bulls depends on a variety of factors, including age and weight loss that occurred over the breeding season. Mature bulls that are in good condition following breeding season can be managed on pasture or an all-forage diet without supplementation, as long as the forage contains 8 to 10% crude protein and is available daily at 2% of body weight.

Yearling bulls following their first breeding season are still growing and require more energy and nutrients regardless of condition when compared to mature bulls. A ration developed for young bulls should target an average daily gain of 1.5 to 2.0 pounds dependent on wight lost during the breeding season. A diet with rude protein of 10 to 11% should be targets for young bulls.

Regardless of diet available and the age of the bull, a good vitamin and mineral program should be followed.

#### **Body Condition Score**

At the beginning of the breeding season, ideally bulls should have a body condition score (BCS) of 6. The S allows for bulls to lose some weight during the breeding season without negatively impacting sperm quality. It is common for bulls to lose 100 to 200 pounds over the breeding season.

In contrast, over-conditioned bulls are not able to efficiently do their job of breeding cows. At higher body condition scores, fat deposition within the scrotum increases, resulting in poorer theoregulation of the testes. This reduction in temperature regulation decreases overall sperm quality.

To prevent last-minute efforts to improve condition score, producers should evaluate their bull's BCS 90 to 120 days prior to turnout to provide adequate time to improve or decrease body condition if necessary.

#### House and Exercise

Bulls should be housed in a pen large enough to allow for adequate exercise.

Additionally, a large pen allows for less-dominant bulls to move away from more-dominant bulls. Bulls will fight to determine social ranking; however, providing space for animals to get away from each other may reduce injuries.

If bulls are being fed at the same time, 24 to 30 inches of feeder space should be provided per head to allow access for all animals and lessen incidences of fighting.

It is important to provide room for exercise to keep bulls in shape for the next breeding season. If proper exercise is not permitted, bulls can lose their endurance and struggle to keep up in the beginning of the breeding season, resulting in a potential reduction of cows bred during the beginning of the season.

Exercise can be encouraged by placing feed and water on opposite ends of the pasture.

Ideally, the winter housing areas would be located away from cows to allow bulls to fully focus on eating and other behaviors rather than breeding cows.
